Pupil premium strategy plan

Statement of intent

Our school is **Attachment Aware and Trauma Informed**.

We will consistently strive to uphold this ethos. This belief will always guide, support and give direction to any decisions made around the use of pupil premium funding for all of our children.

The needs of our school cohort are often significant, always varied and disadvantage is not always the primary challenge our pupils and their families face.

There are 2 hearts at the centre of this school:

- The families that make up our school community, their needs, wants and the challenges.
- The delivery of a high quality, inclusive curriculum with high quality teaching that supports these varied needs.

All of our children will benefit from this premium funding as it will be used to support both individual and whole school approaches. The challenges our children and families face are not unique to the identified disadvantaged children.

We will hold social, emotional, relational and mental health growth and development central to learning. We will support families to engage with their own community, the school community and to invest in learning both in school and in their homes to support their own family lives.

Our strategy will be mindful of the children's future lives, goals and aspirations. We will encourage our children's future and hopes and dreams.

Our strategy will be driven by the needs and strengths of each young person, based on formal and informal assessments, not assumptions or pre-determined labels or expectations. This will help us to ensure that we offer them the relevant skills and experience they require to be prepared for adulthood.

Challenges

This details the key challenges to achievement that we have identified among our children.

Challenge number	Detail of challenge
1	<p>Social, emotional and relational behaviour is significantly detrimental to progress in academic learning</p> <p>Historic information that travels with our children tells us that their educational pathway has been significantly disturbed for one or more of the following reasons:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Poor attendance – sometimes due to non-engagement, part time timetables, multiple school placements, exclusions • Extremely low self-esteem and self-motivation – many failures in academic learning, relationships both with peers and the adults in schools • All children have experienced relational and possibly developmental trauma or attachment difficulties throughout their early years and school experiences
2	<p>Many pupils have secondary barriers to learning.</p> <p>ASC, complex learning needs, OT needs, language processing difficulties, sensory difficulties. These need to be considered in conjunction with their primary need.</p>
3	<p>On-entry data.</p> <p>Our children are working significantly below their age related expectations in all areas of the curriculum. This is especially true of the key skills in writing, spelling and number work.</p>
4	<p>Reduced Curriculum and community offer due to additional needs.</p> <p>Through observations and conversations with pupils and their families, we find that our pupils generally have fewer opportunities to engage with their own communities and to experience key cultural experiences.</p>

Intended outcomes

<p>Challenge 3</p> <p>Improved attainment for all pupils in all subjects, notably reading, writing and maths, relative to their starting points as identified through baseline assessments.</p>	<p>All pupils will have access to a bespoke differentiated curriculum that supports their learning needs.</p> <p>The key skills of reading, writing and spelling will be baselined on entry into the school and programs to support learning will be offered.</p> <p>The in school tracking system will show that children make progress academically over time.</p>
<p>Challenge 4</p> <p>Pupils at Willow Grove will have full access to a full curriculum offer including cultural capital experiences and opportunities.</p>	<p>Families and pupils will report on widened life and school opportunities.</p> <p>School will evidence opportunities for wider life experiences.</p>

Additional activity

Our pupil premium strategy will be supplemented by additional activity that we are not funding using pupil premium or recovery premium but that requires considerable funds from our school budget.

- Continuing to provide a Family Partnership Team that is a family needs led service supporting with bespoke packages and tailored offers.

Planning, implementation and evaluation

In planning our new pupil premium strategy, we evaluated why activity undertaken in previous years had not had the degree of impact that we had expected.

In addition to the pupil premium funded activity outlined above we have also put a sharp focus on supporting teachers to develop their professional practice and train in specialist areas, allowing them to develop expertise and share them with other staff. This will impact on all of our challenge areas and was identified during our most recent Ofsted inspection.
